
## Notes From An American Director Of All 38 Plays: An Intimate Look at Shakespeare's Masterpieces



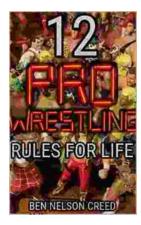
